## Anniversaries

Every January at Starr King Unitarian Universalist Church, we celebrate the anniversary to remember Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and the incredible justice work he did and which, he made us aware, still needs doing. I invite you to join us in ongoing awareness of this work and with a message of hope by your presence in our larger community, at the location of Hayward City Hall at 9:30 A.M. on Monday 21 January. We will listen to music, hear Dr. King's words and put our feet into motion together around our short but important march.



Another important marker this year comes the very next day; 22 January is the 35th anniversary of the Supreme Court decision of Roe v. Wade. A whole generation of women and men have never lived in a time or a place where reproductive freedom in this country was not a reality for them, even though the economic aspect of access to reproductive health has become a continued point of erosion for some of these freedoms which we have come to take for granted.

Over the years, Unitarian Universalist principles and values have led our Commission on Social Witness and our membership to develop resolutions and statements of conscience supporting our freedom of choice in reproductive matters. As one of our ministers explains our religious viewpoint, "we believe that the test of any religious position is an individual's own direct experience of the good, the holy and the true."

Even though we might look at the anniversary of Roe v. Wade as a time of celebration, many anti-choice groups are using this time as an opportunity to continue to work to overturn these laws. In California, work is in progress to gather signatures for a petition, for the third time, to attempt to pass a law requiring parental notification for abortions. As was the case in the earlier attempts, if this proposition should be put on the ballot, it would cost Planned Parenthood alone *millions* of dollars in political response.

I have joined Bay Area clergy as a member of the Planned Parenthood Golden Gate Clergy Advisory Board. I believe that this board will bring advocacy and greater awareness to our faith communities about reproductive health and education, and I feel proud to be a part of it.

Let this New Year be a time to rededicate ourselves to continuing the important work of justice. We have a fabulous faith to serve as our guide.

## Congregational Polity

The term *Congregational Polity* was not well understood by many of us who attended the Pacific Central District Leadership Conference workshop on Governance for UU Congregations in November of 2007. We learned that *polity* is a word of Greek derivation meaning “citizen govern-

ment,” while *congregational* refers to the church structure developed by our forbears from the Protestant Radical Reformation wing, those Puritans who rejected church hierarchy and who came to the Massachusetts colony to establish free churches bound by covenantal agreements. The two words together are used by Unitarian Universalists to describe our form of governance.

It was interesting to learn that, while all UU churches are based on congregational polity, church research shows that there are critical issues in church governance related to a church’s size. There are four size categories of churches: Family size (0-50), Pastoral Size (50-150), Program Size (150-360) and Corporate Size (350-500). Our church membership puts us on the outer edge of pastoral size.

There are limitations and challenges for each size church. An interesting example is found in the workshop handout titled “Governance for Unitarian Universalist Congregations,” illustrating the consequences of a pastoral church undertaking unrealistic program development. “Trying to force a pastoral-size congregation to function as if it were a corporate size ... is a formula for volunteer burnout. Such a church has neither the staff nor the resources to support its practices ...” Congregations are urged to practice a philosophy of governance consistent with their size.

In all church sizes, the congregation has the highest authority. In a pastoral size church such as ours, authority is delegated to the Board and the Minister in order to promote efficient and flexible decision-making. However, best practices require that Board decisions be transparent and clearly communicated to the congregation.

Currently, we have an opportunity to participate in congregational-style governance.



Your Board is working on the Unitarian House replacement project, a project that includes enlarging classrooms, improving the office and creating more kitchen space. Thus far, the Board subcommittee has been monitoring the development of the site plan and exterior building design. On Sunday 6 January 2008, after second service, members will have an opportunity to meet Dave Byrens, the architect for our church addition. This meeting is intended to update interested members of the congregation and to promote discussion of the plan thus far, as well as suggestions and concerns related to future steps. It is essential to the Board as it continues to carry this project forward — and consistent with “congregational polity”— that it have a clear sense of the wishes of the congregation.



## OUR CHURCH BOARD IN ACTION

### December 2007

*The following is a summary of the Board’s business meeting. Feel free to discuss any of these items with Board members.*

1. Update on Building project to replace Unitarian House: \$2,000 was paid to the county for permits. A meeting was held for leaders to receive input on plans. A congregational informational meeting will be held on 6 January after the second service.
2. Greeter training was held 9 December.
3. Service auction will be 16 February 2008 and is being coordinated by Terri Owen.
4. Board voted to give the office manager an end-of-year bonus.
5. Board voted to contract for more regular cleaning.
6. Board members giving the announcements should collect the announcements and give them from the microphone (not having individual members come up).
7. Treasurer’s Report: The Green Sanctuary Committee will look at a recycling cart (annual cost \$540) as a part of its proposal. Pledge receipts are behind schedule.
8. Board received an assessment of the religious education program given by intern. Recommendation that the board and entire congregation needs to take ownership of the program to develop healthy functioning. A plan for visioning is being arranged with leadership involvement.

## Earth Ministry, Karen Urbano

Join Earth Ministry at Starr King Church! Our next meeting will be on Sunday 27 January at 12:30 P.M. to continue planning for our Green Sanctuary effort. We are starting our environmental assessment to see where we stand in several areas. Once that is completed, we can develop our plan of action. The assessment will cover several areas. The following questions will be answered.

- **ENERGY:** What are your energy usage patterns and current conservation practices?
- **RECYCLING:** What are the local recycling procedures and what is your level of compliance?
- **NON-DISPOSABLE MATERIALS:** What are the existing policies for use of non-disposable materials, environmentally friendly cleaning supplies, etc.?
- **PURCHASING AND INVESTING:** What existing church policies govern purchasing and investing decisions? Are your investments in keeping with your environmental and other social values?
- **LANDSCAPING:** Do you have landscaping policies that direct use of native species, landscape chemicals, etc.?
- **RELIGIOUS EDUCATION:** What current religious education programs relate to the environment for both children and adults?
- **WORSHIP:** How well does your worship integrate the wisdom of the Earth?

- **SOCIAL ACTION:** How is earth caring a part of your overall social action program?
- **OTHER ISSUES:** What other environmental issues come up in discussion groups and adult education classes, in policy proposals for the congregation and in the local community that might be the basis for a Green Sanctuary program or activity?

## What's the Word? *Al Murdach*

*This monthly column explores today's meaning and significance of some important religious words from the Christian tradition.*

### No.23: **Satan**

It may seem a bit odd to start the new year with some reflections about the Prince of Demons, but since so much of our time during the year is spent dealing with the effects of various evils, both human and natural, it may not be totally beside the point. Of course UUs, along with most others in the Christian tradition, no longer believe in the reality of the Devil. My own denomination, the Roman Catholic Church, acknowledges his existence but seems somewhat embarrassed by the idea, which seems so unappealing in our scientific age. So why even bring the subject up?

Let us begin with some history and then move on to current events. For many centuries before ours the Christian tradition, as well as other religious traditions, spoke often and urgently of the importance of avoiding the clutches of the Devil, or any like evil supernatural being who wielded immense destructive power over human affairs if only he (the being was usually male) gained human consent and cooperation for his designs. With the rise of science beginning in the 16th century, many evils (sickness, personal calamity, mental illness, general misfortune, etc.) began to be perceived as being within human control and understanding. Thus, no longer was it possible to refer convincingly to any of these events, at least when they weren't being blamed on God, as "the devil's work". In fact, UUism in this country was in the forefront in gradually draining away the significance of such attributions so that now to use them in discussing human affairs seems both arcane and laughable.

But lest we think that belief in the Devil has by now been completely destroyed by the enlightened views of UUs and other liberal types, we need to examine the evidence of popular culture, in which the Devil seems to again be enjoying a resurgence. Today in film, TV, art, music, and drama we see and hear many depictions of the rampant evil and satanic tendencies in our times. A 2007 movie guide, for example, lists no less than three full pages of films with "Devil" in the title. Current events as reported in the media also seem to corroborate the existence of wide-spread evil and ruin despite the best efforts of reformers and seekers of social justice. It could be that these developments are behind the recent rise of interest and concern about the wide-spread and seemingly unstoppable reach of the diabolical in modern life.

If this be true, it may not be amiss to reconsider again the historical importance of the concept of the Devil, or at least the devilish, in our lives. For the Devil, despite the outlandish and sometimes ridiculous ways in which he was traditionally represented, was always a reminder that evil is fundamentally personal in nature. That is, it always begins with a human choice between alternatives. Choices, even when well-intentioned, can lead sometimes to disaster, sometimes to benefit, and sometimes to indifferent outcomes. When choices become tainted by the spirit of evil, or pure self-aggrandizement, great harm to all is assured. Therefore UUs, as believers in the promise of human potential, could in this coming year make the fulfillment of this potential more achievable by not forgetting the Devil in each one of us and our need to counteract it by increasing our foreknowledge through study and reflection and our love for others by continued commitment to the unending struggle for social justice.
