I believe it was Alice Walker, a humanist, who said, "They come to church to share God, not find God." And given her theological bent, I'd say that comment says more about people and community than it does about the nature of God. It says to me that there is something holy, sacred, even divine, about what we experience when we come together and maybe also in how we are when we are with each other. (I invite you to look elsewhere in this newsletter for the latest information on our draft covenant of good relations, which speaks to the intentionality of our contacts here.)



Recently, when our liaison to the district Growth Committee phoned to check in with us, I shared with her my excitement about all of the wonderful people and activities at our church. We have the great fortune to have recently welcomed into membership a number of new folks, and it has been a joy to see visitors each week gracing our doors, bringing hopeful hearts and minds. I have found that this influx of people has infused us with a spiritual virus of which we've had both want and need. One of the participants at a workshop a number of us attended last weekend wisely remarked, "When I look at these new people I see the missing pieces of our congregation!"

I know for me, the notion that God is in the relationships so often tells the story. In other words, our religiously liberal

community inspires passion when I see and hear people connecting with each other, discovering new parts of themselves and listening deeply to others. I believe that we offer transformation and growth when I see us reach out to others in our community and when we look outside ourselves to make the world better. Our members tell me they are moved by the candles of prayer that others light during worship, that they are stirred by the sharing that takes place in our small groups, and they are overjoyed when we come together at events such as our Martin Luther King, Jr. march, a South Hayward Parish community activity that just celebrated its fifth successful year and that was inspired in large part by this congregation.

There is Good News about Unitarian Universalism and some darn-good news about Starr King Church. This is a place where we can come to be authentic with each other, where we can come to grow and learn and discover a richer and more meaningful inner life. I invite you to find a way to share your wisdom, your discoveries and even your uncertainties and struggles with each other, whether you do that sitting in the sanctuary, washing in the kitchen, digging in the gardens of the grounds or visiting in the office. Come to this church to share. Share God or yourself, or share the love of life.

A New Kind of Growth

On Saturday, January 13 I joined a delegation of Starr King members and our minister at a wonderful growth workshop for area congregations. Retired Unitarian Universalist minister Larry Peers, a consultant with the interfaith Alban Institute, led the workshop. I went expecting to listen to and share ideas about how to get more visitors in the door and how to grow our membership. I came away thinking more deeply about why we want membership growth.



I think quite often about growth in our congregation. We are a very friendly, welcoming congregation. When I first came to Starr King about six years ago, I had already tried a couple of other UU churches and was not terribly excited about them. But when I visited Starr King, several people made sincere efforts to connect with me and to make me feel welcome every Sunday. Being a joiner by nature, I got on a number of committees and attended an adult RE course. I soon felt I was an integral part of the church and the church a part of me. My church experience extended beyond Sunday morning.

Since then, I've visited some of the big east coast UU churches and found Sunday services to be quite a lonely experience. In Massachusetts I stood in the hospitality hall after Sunday service with my green "visitors" coffee cup and felt very uncomfortable. The room was crowded with scores of people rushing this way and that, but when they saw my "visitors" coffee cup, they turned and walked away. I finally had to stand in front of someone and introduce myself to strike up any conversation.

I don't think we have that kind of problem at Starr King. I think we're a friendly congregation. We could do better, though, in bringing visitors fully into the fabric of our congregation, not only in welcoming them, but also in nurturing, empowering and serving our congregants.

At the workshop, Larry Peers talked about *growing the soul* of the congregation and building on congregational strengths to develop a more spiritual and meaningful church experience for all. He talked about paradigm shifts in the ways we do church. We focused on the big picture. There is an inter-relationship, we learned, between the welcoming, nurturing, empowering and serving systems of every congregation.

Over 250 UU members attended his workshop. Through a series of exercises, each congregation team explored the

cultural and historical heritage of their own congregation. We learned through introspection some of the cultural and historical baggage that has held us back. We also looked at our successes and how they came about. We shared our dreams and visions of our church in the future.

I hope to join others at Starr King to envision a future where welcoming, nurturing, empowering and serving each other and our outside community is an integral part of our spiritual experience. In my dream, an integrated system would see us all welcoming visitors with a sense of presence and spirituality. In this vision, our holy work would not stop at our door, but would include an integrated system for personal growth, support and empowerment that would enrich us all.



OUR CHURCH BOARD IN ACTION

January 2007

The following is a summary of the Board's business meeting. Feel free to discuss any of these items with Board members.

1. The latest revision of the Covenant of Good Relations, incorporating comments congregants contributed in the fall, was approved. It will be presented to the congregation for further comments before the annual meeting.
2. Unitarian House Update: The subcommittee supported immediate abatement of lead from the building; this is scheduled for 12 January. An informational congregational meeting will present our membership with the options available.
3. The Board Retreat is to be 27 January at the Livermore church from 9 to 3.
4. A written request to have a church online bulletin service with member activities and announcements was approved.
5. Ministry of Hospitality: The Board is discussing ways to integrate new people into the congregation.
6. Jeff Lambkin requested endorsement by our church for his ministry in community work with South Hayward Parish. The board approved his request and the proposal will be presented at the annual meeting for affirmation.
7. The play *Love Letters* has been approved by the copyright owners for production here in February.

Important Information: *Plans for Replacing Unitarian House*

Your Board of Trustees has been meeting for a number of months to consider how to deal with our aging and deteriorating Unitarian House. As a result of in-depth investigation and reports from members responsible for the building's maintenance, the Board has concluded that Unitarian House should be demolished and replaced. Where, when and how are questions still under consideration.

Please plan to stay after second service on Sunday 25 February, when the Unitarian House subcommittee of the Board will present the issues, following which there will be a question and answer period.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Pension Protection Act of 2006, signed by President Bush on 17 August 2006, included several provisions affecting the deduction of charitable contributions. Here are a couple of prominent provisions:

1. Beginning in 2007, in the case of cash contributions, no matter the amount, written records are required to substantiate the tax deduction or the contribution will be disallowed. For example, the small amounts of cash deposited in the church collection basket will not be deductible unless paid by check or acknowledged in writing by the charity.

2. For contributions made on or after 17 August 17 2006 you cannot take a charitable contribution deduction for donations of clothing or household items unless the item is in "good used condition or better." The law does not define "good condition" so you may want to photograph the item donated or be more discriminating in donating items. If the amount claimed is more than \$500 a qualified appraisal will be required.

NOTE: California has not yet conformed to the above rules for state income tax purposes.

Coffee servers: check carefully in the coffee/kitchen supply closet. If supplies are low, leave a note for Sherry.

✦ To preserve a sense of worship on Sunday mornings, please remember to **switch off cell phones** and other devices before entering the Sanctuary.

Covenant of Good Relations

In the covenantal tradition of Unitarian Universalism, we strive to build our religious community on a foundation of kindness, understanding and tolerance and to be guided by our principles in all our actions and interactions. We covenant to welcome one another as unique individuals and to celebrate our diverse beliefs as we walk our chosen paths together. We promise to share our gifts and to encourage and appreciate the contributions of others. To foster a community of respect, we will speak kindly of one another and to one another and, should difficulties arise between or among us, we will speak directly to those concerned with the goal of reconciliation. We will not engage in harmful gossip, and we will urge others to resolve difficulties on a one-to-one basis. Should we need assistance to restore good relations, we will call upon the process and resources provided by Starr King Church. We will participate in the democratic process by which our religious community governs itself, and we will respect the outcomes of the collective wisdom. For the health and wellbeing of our beloved community, we make this pledge together.

Over the past eighteen months or so, our congregation has conducted a conversation to develop a Covenant of Good Relations. This process has been facilitated by the Committee on Shared Ministry (COSMIC).

This type of covenant is a tool that helps congregations express the intentional behaviors they wish to encourage in order to foster a spiritually healthy community.

Usually a Covenant of Good Relations is revisited and revised, if desired, every few years. This makes it a flexible tool that can reflect the growing goals and aspirations of our community of faith. Here at Starr King, we hope to be able to vote to adopt our Covenant of Good Relations at our annual meeting in May 2007.

Please take a few moments to read the DRAFT covenant printed in the box above. It has been reviewed by our

Board of Trustees, and your further responses, suggestions or questions are also important to the process of developing a Covenant of Good Relations that is meaningful for Starr King Church.

In the DRAFT above, COSMIC has attempted to incorporate the suggestions and concerns that our members expressed in response to the previous draft. Please let us know if we have heard and understood you!
